He eventually attended SD Law School, graduating with his Juris Doctorate. He was a longtime member of the State Bar of South Dakota. Mickel eventually became Deputy States Attorney in Pennington County and served a term in the South Dakota Legislature in the mid-70s. Then he opened the Mickel Law Practice until he retired in 2004.

Chuck spent many years sailing, cross country skiing, bike riding, hiking, rock hunting and fishing. He was an avid photographer of wildlife and landscapes. His biggest hobby was showing his

canine companions, two trained cattle dogs. He was very active with the Rapid City Kennel Club.

He volunteered at the SD Fish & Game's Outdoor Campus-West and with the SD Grasslands Wilderness Coalition. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge in White River for 50 years.

Katie Jensen, Mickel's sister, recalls her brother sitting on his deck enjoying retirement when he decided to become even more active in his community with his interest in building. He bought a few tools and volunteered with retired contractors and carpenters to learn the trade.

When he found Habitat for Humanity, he saw community value in the work and wanted to be more involved.

Chuck became a regular Habitat volunteer, clocking 1,830 volunteer hours. He served on the Habitat for Humanity Board for six years and on the Nomination Committee as well.

Legacy of Giving

Mickel passed away on Sept. 17, 2014 and left an incredible gift to the Black Hills Area Habitat for Humanity -- a \$10,000 donation.

His generous donation of nearly 2,000 volunteer hours in addition to the monetary donation helped many families and will forever impact the Rapid City community.

Habitat grows stronger with volunteers like Chuck. His presence is greatly missed, but his memory and the work he contributed will live on forever.

National Women Build Week

"Home ownership creates feelings of pride in living independently, and promotes responsibility to one's self, one's family and one's community. I am honored to be a part of such a worthwhile cause and am grateful for the opportunity to serve," says Barber.

In a week-long national campaign, dozens of local volunteers came to show their support for our community on Saturday, May 2nd. Across the country, Women Build saw over 23,000 volunteers build homes for people in need. Lowe's partnership made our Women Build a success, along with hard-working, dedicated volunteers and team leaders.

Volunteers React

"I love Habitat because it gives people an opportunity to own their own home," long-time volunteer and committee chairwoman Cathie Harris commented. "It's really powerful to be here today to have all these women, and particularly the Lowe's heroes, who are helping us."

"It feels amazing to work with a group of women," volunteer Carol White remarked. "So empowering for them," added the fitness trainer. "We're just sweating out there, but we're having fun and everybody's working together as a team..."

New Home, New Life

The walls built by volunteers put the Brown family closer to owning a home, where they will always have secure, reliable shelter. "They have a safe, clean, happy environment," Harris said about homes provided by Habitat to families like the Browns. "Just to be off the streets and provide safe, decent housing-- that's what Habitat's about." The Brown family will receive their new home keys by early 2016.

HOME PRESERVATION PROJECT

Home Preservation Projects help with interior and exterior repairs as well as weatherization. Homeowners make affordable monthly payments and volunteers provide savings by reducing costs to the families. Home Preservation is active primarily from May through September, but applications are accepted year round and work is completed in any season weather permitting.
